## AARNET DOUBLES YOUR DATA

AARNet's Chief Executive Officer Chris Hancock has announced a 50% reduction in the Off Net data costs for all customers, beginning in January 2011.

AARNet introduced a number of major charging initiatives in 2009:

- Unmetered Domestic Peering traffic.
- Unmetered Off Peak traffic.
- Waiving some Excess Traffic charges.
- Unmetered Akamai traffic.

These changes have resulted in the percentage of unmetered traffic increasing from around 30% in 2008 to over 70% in 2010. When the current charging formula was first introduced in 2005, unmetered traffic accounted for less than 15%

of all traffic.

At its meeting in June, the AARNet Board approved a number of additional pricing changes for 2010 and 2011:

Excess traffic charges for Q3 and Q4 2010 will be waived.

- 2011 Off Net subscriptions will be the same as for 2010.
- Traffic charges will be reduced from \$4 per GB to \$2 per GB in 2011.
- The Off Peak period will be extended to 5:00pm – 9:00am during 2011.

The charge for volume-

based customers will reduce to \$4 per GB for all download traffic in 2011.

These changes effectively mean that all subscription-based customers will receive double the Off Net traffic allowance for the same charge as in 2010, and that the proportion of unmetered traffic will increase to over 80% in 2011.

For HHERN members this will give a pool of 4 Terabytes of Off Net data to share amongst the group for the same cost.



## HHERN TO THE NBN

A common question asked is: "What will happen to HHERN when

the National Broadband Network finally arrives?" The simple answer is we can't be absolutely sure but there are things we know that we know....

We know that the NBN is being rolled out over many years. The second stage is due to commence in the middle of 2011, if the new government pur-



sues it. Stage two will take more than a year to complete. We are most likely

looking at many years of waiting but an NBN will happen one day.

HHERN is built to do one thing, deliver fast inexpensive useable capacity to support education, health and research in the region. Sounds like an NBN? Well yes, actually. The NBN is a wholesale network meaning that the

HHERN can join in and provide capacity through the NBN to participants when it finally arrives.

You can be sure that AARNet is working closely with the NBN and that is good for HHERN.

So the NBN will be good for HHERN and our members with all the savings achieved being passed back to members. That is why it is worth joining. Get the NBN benefits now!

## VIDEO CONFERENCE WITH FANTASY AUTHOR KATE FORSYTH.

*HHERN provides communication services to connect educational institutions to the Australian Academic and Research Network (AARNet).*

*HHERN aggregates the institutions under HHERN'S membership with AARNet. This sharing allows schools and institutions to connect at a lower cost and best of all, education data from AARNet is free!*

*For Schools the formula is simple, total dollar costs to HHERN divided by the number of students. The cost per head is reduced as we add schools and students.*

*For non-school institutions an estimate of network usage is determined and a fee is then put into the formula which again reduces the participant's costs.*

*The simple aim of HHERN is to provide exceptional educational Internet access that would otherwise be cost prohibitive.*

## STATE LIBRARY OF VICTORIA

The State Library of Victoria is Australia's oldest public library and Victoria's premier reference and research library. When it opened in 1856, the library contained less than 4,000 books.

Today the library houses more than 2 million collection items, has over 1.5 million visitors a year and provides digital ac-

cess to 35,000 electronic publications. The Library also provides approximately 30 terabytes of data to library users, something that is expected to increase sharply with its new AARNet connection.
